JANUARY 2015

City of Jersey Village Solicitor Rules

In layman's terms, the following rules apply to solicitation within Jersey Village:

Any individual, firm, organization or corporation is prohibited from engaging in the taking of orders, the sale of commodities, services, or the solicitation of subscriptions or donations from house-to-house or place-to-place without a permit from the city. There are a few exemptions from this in the case of a noncommercial or nonprofit purpose or cause.

Solicitors must wear or display an identification card provided by the city. Solicitors may only solicit during the hours of 9:00am8:00pm and 9:00am-9:00pm during daylight savings time. If there are deviations from these rules, or you have doubts about the person conducting the solicitation, please contact the police department at the non-emergency number (713-466-5824) and an officer will be dispatched to your location.

How to Prevent Residential Burglary

• Perform routine tasks and clean up the outside of your property on a regular basis to show you are occupying your home.

• Install timed lights or leave a radio or television playing if you are traveling or will be absent from your home for long periods of time.

• Lock all your doors, windows, garages, and sheds when you leave your home to make it difficult for burglars to enter without attracting the attention of others.

• Stray away from routine schedules to make it more difficult for burglars to predict when you will be absent from you home. • Use lighting on the outside that does not create glare or deep shadows.

• Make your doors and windows visible to the neighborhood and to the street. Cut away tree branches or high shrubbery that can hide the view.

• Store your valuables away from windows or doors where they can easily be seen from the outside.

• Hide or destroy any outside trash that may advertise your personal belongings to the rest of your neighborhood.

• Leave spare house keys with trusted friends, family, or neighbors instead of placing them outside on your property.

• Park your vehicles inside a closed garage if you have one to make it difficult for burglars to determine if you are home or not.

 \bullet Install a home alarm system to deter burglars and to alarm police if there is a break-in. \bigstar

Kitchen Safety

Did you know the kitchen is where more home fires occur than anywhere else in the house and that cooking is the number one cause of home fires? Here are some ways to prevent kitchen fires in your home.

1. Never leave cooking food unattended – stay in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. If you have to leave the kitchen, even for a second, turn off the stove or take a cooking utensil to remind you that you have food cooking in the kitchen..

2. Check your food regularly while cooking and remain in the home while cooking.

3. Use a timer so you'll remember that the stove or oven is on.

4. Don't wear loose clothing or dangling sleeves while cooking.

5. Keep the kids away from the cooking area. Enforce a "kid-free zone" and make them stay at least three feet away from the stove.

6. Keep anything that can catch fire pot holders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, and towels or curtains—away from your stove, oven or any other appliance in the kitchen that generates heat.

7. Clean cooking surfaces on a regular basis to prevent grease buildup.

8. Consider purchasing a fire extinguisher to keep in your kitchen.

9. Always check the kitchen before going to bed or leaving the home to make sure all stoves, ovens, and small appliances are turned off.

10. Install a smoke alarms throughout your home and on each level of your home, near sleeping areas, and inside and outside bedrooms if you sleep with doors closed. Use the test button to check it each month. Remember to change your batteries in each smoke detector each time you change your clocks. \bigstar

Special Event Policy

The city has adopted a new special event policy. This policy requires that a special event permit be required under certain circumstances. These are listed as follows:

Special event means a temporary event, gathering or organized activity, including but not limited to parades, bike races, marathons, walk-a-thons, concerts, carnivals, other types of races and festivals, parties, social events, First Amendment events and is expected to attract:

1. More than 50 persons; or

2. More than 25 persons, if 51 percent or more of those persons may reasonably be expected to be younger than 21 years of age and it is planned or may reasonably be expected that alcoholic beverages will be sold, served, or consumed at or around the event; and

3. At which the persons will remain for more than two continuous hours; or for any amount of time during the period beginning at 10 p.m. and ending at 6 a.m.

A permit is not required under these circumstances:

1. An event conducted entirely on the property of a religious institution or educational institution;

2. City sponsored events at municipal buildings, parks or golf course;

3. Property owned or controlled by the city subject to a contract, lease or management/operating agreement with a private party where the agreement addresses events on the property or the event is included within the permitted uses in the agreement;

4. Processions of vehicles operated in compliance with ordinary traffic laws or a procession of pedestrians along or upon public sidewalks, public parks, or private property; 5. Events held for National Night Out;
6. First Amendment activity conducted at the following locations: entirely on sidewalks, in public parks or on private property;

7. Events conducted under the supervision of or with the permission of a governmental entity on property owned, leased, or operated by a governmental entity if the event does not require the closing or rerouting of a public street; or

8. Events conducted entirely on private property that does not significantly impact public roads or safety.

The policy was created to enhance the delivery of city services in a safe a predictable fashion. These types of permits allow the city to properly staff and monitor events that significantly impact traffic and public safety within the city.



Crime Prevention Tips from JVPD

Burglary of a Vehicle

This kind of window shopping is never good.

One of the most frequent comments I will get while meeting with citizens while I am on patrol or at the police station is, "They love living in Jersey Village because it is so safe here." Jersey Village is fortunate that it has one of the lowest crime rates for an incorporated city in the Houston Region. But even with low crime rates, one of the most common crimes we have is having your car broken into. Whether you are at the shopping center or at home, a Burglary of Vehicle (BOV) can take place and the thieves can be in and out of your vehicle in a matter of seconds. The good news is that there are a number of steps that you can take to help reduce the chance that you will be a victim of a BOV.

• Lock your car doors. As simple as it sounds, you might just be surprised how many reports officers take where the victim

has left there door unlocked. That being said, almost all cars have alarm systems. Be sure and set yours when you are out of your car.

• Out of sight, out of mind. That computer, cell phone, guitar or wallet that is visible through the window makes an inviting target. If you have to leave these items in the car, then leave them out of sight preferably in the trunk, under a seat or covered up. If a thief is, "Window shopping" then they will only take things they can see and are quickly accessible.

• Come into the light. When going out, and at home always try and park your vehicle under or near a light. This doesn't stop criminals but may deter them because they can be identified easier because of the light.

Though these suggestions are not always full proof, these are just a few things you can do to reduce your chances of being a victim. If you are a victim, don't touch anything and notify the police immediately and make a report even if you decide not to report it to your insurance company. Thanks for your time and if there is anything we can do for you, please give us a call.



Transporting to Local Hospitals

When an ambulance is called to your home or business for an emergency and EMS staff evaluates you; part of our thinking is to try and determine where we should take you for continued care. Several factors run through our minds to determine what hospital facility we take you to. We look at the services offered at the hospital and how fast you will be seen by the ER staff. It is very important to us that you are seen in a timely fashion. This is not only for your health, but to make sure we get our ambulance back in service to help the next medical patient.

Over the past year, both our local hospitals (North Cypress and Cypress Fairbanks) have been striving to improve. At both of these hospitals, the goal for you to be seen and placed in a room is within 15 minutes. During peak times and times when they are saturated with patients, the time they attempt to meet is under 30 minutes. Both hospitals have also made some advancements in their treatment of patients. North Cypress is now a Designated Stroke Center and can handle calls from a cardiac arrest to a simple nose bleed. Cypress Fairbanks is now a Level 3 Trauma center with the ability to handle Trauma, Strokes, Cardio, Neuro and Orthopedic and have those Doctors and Surgeons on site within 30 minutes of us notifying them and ready to operate soon after if surgery is necessary.

I would encourage all of our residents to learn more about these facilities as these will be the primary hospitals we will transport our patients to. We still will transport to other hospitals when the call requires it. Please keep in mind that travel times have increased dramatically with road construction taking place around the city and in our area.

RECYCLE!



The City of Jersey Village encourages everyone to participate in the city's recycling program! Here are some simple

(but effective) ways you can move your

family towards your green home goals. Keep it simple. If you want your family and especially your children to start recycling, you'll have better success if you make it easy for them. Set your family recycling cans in a high-traffic area, preferably near the garbage can. If you need to separate your recyclables in your area, make sure each can is prominently marked to help your kids.

Set clear goals. Understanding recycling and its impact on the environment can be difficult or small children. Instead, provide them with a tangible goal such as throwing out no more than three bags of trash each week. Keep track of each successful week and treat your family to pizza at the end of a good month. Your kids will work hard towards the goal and you'll make their at home recycling a pleasurable experience. Work with them to conserve. Sometimes materials can be recycled without ever going into the recycling bin. Work to teach your kids not to be wasteful with the materials they already use. Teach them to draw on both sides of their paper or write on both sides in their notebook. Instead of providing them with a new cup each time they want a drink, encourage them to use the same cup throughout the day. You can also set a positive example by taking clothing or toys your children have outgrown and donate them to a local charity rather than simply throw them away.

Making Home Improvements?

Being a homeowner comes along with many expenses. One of which is home improvement repairs and remodels. Everyone appreciates a well maintained home; however it is easy to overlook the necessary permitting requirements.

Pulling a permit is not only an ordinance requirement, but provides another level of protection for the homeowner. Contractors are required to provide proof of state licenses necessary to perform specific types of work. In addition, the City Building Official will perform inspections on the work being done. Permits can be obtained by the homeowner or the contractor, but keep in mind that it is ultimately the homeowner's responsibility to be certain that a permit is obtained prior to the commencement of work.

Some types of permits include, but are not limited to the following: Repair or replacement of fences, roofs, siding, driveways, the installation of swimming pools and irrigation systems, any type of remodel: including but not limited to bathrooms, kitchens, room additions, and the installation of building sheds or storage buildings.

Finding Lost Pets

Here are steps you can take to make it easier to find your pets if they are ever lost. ALWAYS KEEP IDENTIFICATION ON YOUR PET and check tags often making sure they are legible. MICROCHIP YOUR PET! Talk to your veterinarian. SPAY/NEUTER YOUR PET! REPAIR LOOSE BOARDS AND HOLES IN FENCING!

IF YOU PET IS LOST IMMEDIATELY TAKE THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS!

Post signs at grocery stores, pet stores, veterinary clinics, and churches.

Walk, bike, or drive slowly through the neighborhood calling your pet's name. Hearing your voice may encourage your pet to answer you. After calling your pet's name, remain in one place long enough for your pet to find you. Go out at night with a flashlight and call for your pet.

• Ask neighbors and the postman if they have seen your pet. Print and hand out flyers with your pet's photo and your phone numbers.

• Visit animal shelters, rescues, and animalcontrol and file a "Lost" pet report with them. Provide an accurate description and a photo of your pet. Check with the shelters every few days. Notify the police if you believe that your pet may have been stolen.

• If lost near a busy highway or road, contact the Texas Department of Transportation.

When you find your pet! Make certain to inform all the places you contacted and remove all flyers.

Lost Cat Tip: The majority of "lost" cats remain in the general area from which they disappeared.

Lost Dog Tip: A "lost" dog will likely travel into the oncoming wind. Make this your first direction of search.

On March 8, 2015 at 2:00 am we will once again change our clocks. Daylight Savings Time comes twice a year for us. It is something we plan for and must do to stay on time for that day and all days to follow. The Fire Department would like to remind everyone that on March 8, 2015 it is also a good day to remove your batteries from you smoke detectors and replace them with fresh batteries. Smoke Detectors are our first line of notification when a fire occurs in your home. This is especially true when we are sleeping. The one sense that continues to really work in the human body is our hearing when we are asleep. Batteries are relatively an inexpensive investment for peace of mind that you and your family escape the dangers of a fire. If your smoke detectors require replacement, most hardware stores or large retail chains carry them for less than \$10.00 each. ★



Tips on Taking Care of Your Home this Spring

The sun is shining and the birds are chirping... it's springtime! Here are a few spring home maintenance tips that will have you primed to keep your home at its best this spring:

1. **Check Your Gutters:** Winter storms and autumn leaves can clog up your gutters, preventing your home from draining properly. Visually inspect your gutters and clear away any leaves or debris so you're all ready for those "April Showers".

2. Air Filters: Now is a great time to change the air filters on your heating and cooling systems to clear away the winter dust and ensure you'll have fresh air throughout your home. Air filters should be changed approximately every three months (although some air filters require monthly changes – check the documentation on your air conditioning unit and heating system to find out what air filters to use and when to change them).

3. Prep Your Lawn for Spring: Clear away any leaves, debris and weeds you

may have missed over the winter – you'll give your lawn room to breathe and grow

4. Check Your Batteries: With the coming of each new season, make it a habit to test out the batteries on your smoke and CO2 detectors.

5. **Cut Shrubs and Trees:** To prevent your plants from impacting your home, trim overgrown trees and shrubs. Tree branches should be about 7 feet away from your home.

6. Oven and Stove Top: Run the cleaning cycle on your oven and thoroughly clean your stove top to prevent built-up grease from becoming a fire hazard.
7. Fire Extinguisher Check-Up: Check, test and replace your fire extinguishers as needed. Check the gauges on each unit to ensure they are charged and ready for use.

Keep these tips in mind to keep your home beautiful and functioning at its best. \bigstar

Crime Prevention Tips from JVPD

Keeping your Credit Card Safe

Credit Card Abuse is one of the fastest growing crimes in the United States. Just within the last two years there have been several high profile data breeches of credit card numbers from large and small businesses. This crime is particularly frustrating because you may not know it is happening until you get your monthly statement, and by then you may be several thousand dollars in the black. The good news is that most banks will not hold the owner liable for the fraudulent charges as long as they file a police report.

When your credit card number is compromised it typically isn't anything that you have done. When I was an investigator, investigating credit card abuse cases one of the things I realized is that when it comes to a computer, there is always someone smarter then you are. Even as a police officer I have had my credit card number stolen. Nevertheless here are a few steps that you can take to ensure the security of your credit cards while in your possession.

• Handle With Care.

While cardholders may toss their keys and their mobile phones into their pockets and purses, it is never a good idea to carry a credit card outside of your wallet. It can get misplaced, dropped and even stolen.

• Be Careful With Your Mail.

Not all credit card theft is high tech. One of the most common ways thieves target credit card users is by intercepting their mail. It is pretty easy to spot when a new credit card is in the mail and most of the citizens in Jersey Village have "Traditional" mailboxes that are curbside in front of your home. These types of boxes are convenient but unsecure and subject to theft. Consider having your card sent to a P.O. Box (if you have one).

• **Dispose of Your Statements Securely.** Another way thieves can gain access to your accounts is by getting information from your bank statements. These statements can contain personal and account information that thieves can use to steal your identity. Try online statements that have to be downloaded from a secure website and if you do have paper statements use a cross threaded shredder.

• Social Media.

How many of you have your full birthday on your social media pages? Though it may be nice to have someone wish you happy birthday, online hackers use this information to steel your identity. Check the security settings and keep yourself safe online.

• Always Check Your Credit.

Annualcreditreport.com is the official site to get your free annual credit reports which is guaranteed by Federal Law.



New Recycling Program



The City received notice from Tascon that they will no longer be collecting recyclables in Jersey Village. Their last day of service will be May 13, 2015. Therefore, Council authorized the City to negotiate a new contract with WCA, our current solid waste vendor. Our new contract will begin May 20, 2015 with WCA picking up recyclables and

solid waste. WCA will provide 65 gallon recycle containers on wheels that can easily be pulled to the curb for collection. With

this new contract residents will no longer be required to sort recyclables and all items can be placed in the 65 gallon cart provided. The new contract will also allow residents to recycle more types of materials. Acceptable recyclable materials include: paper, plastics #1-#7, cardboard, pots & pans, glass bottles and jars, aluminum cans, copper and scrap metals.

Smoke Detectors in your Home

In a recent Citizens Fire Academy class, I was surprised to hear from so many citizens that they were unsure about their smoke detectors in their home. Do you know what smoke detectors you have in your home? Are your smoke detectors battery operated only and independent of each other? Are they in line or hard wired with a backup battery inside the smoke detector? Or is that backup battery in the main alarm control box? How often have you changed your batteries? How often have you tested your smoke detector? That evening was filled with questions. One question I had from the citizens was how long should we keep our smoke detectors before we replace them?

Most standard smoke detectors have a life between 7 and 10 years. The best way to know is to check with the manufacturer of the product.

There are many brands of smoke alarms on the market, but they fall under two basic types: lonization and photoelectric.

City Seeking to FIII Council Vacancy

Council Member Justin Ray, currently serving in Place 1 on the City Council, has submitted his application for a place on the May 9, 2015 ballot as Mayor. Given that no other applicants have submitted an application for place on ballot for the position of Mayor, Council Member Ray is running unopposed. Accordingly, once he takes the oath of office as Mayor on May 18, 2015, he will automatically resign his position as Council Member Place 1, creating a vacancy on City Council.

City Council is now seeking applications to fill the vacant Place 1 on the City Council for the unexpired term that will end in May, 2016. Please write "City Council" under the Comments Section of the application. Completed forms should be delivered to the City Secretary at City Hall, or e-mailed to the office of the city secretary no later than 12:00 PM, May 5, 2015. Incomplete applications and applications received after this deadline will not be forwarded to city council.

City Council has requested that prospective candidates be prepared to deliver a three to five minute presentation at a Special City Council Meeting to be held on May 11, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. Candidates should be prepared to present their qualifications for office, in addition to providing an explanation of why they desire to hold office. ★

lonization and photoelectric smoke alarms detect different types of fires. Since no one can really know what type of fire might start in their home, the United States Fire Administration (USFA) recommends that every home or place where people sleep have both ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms or dual sensor smoke alarms.

The cost of smoke alarms range from the standard \$6.00 per alarm to the dual sensor smoke alarms at about \$30.00 per alarm. Both are a small price to pay for the comfort in knowing that you are protected while you sleep. The USFA reports that three out of five fire deaths results in properties that do not have a working smoke detector. 37 percent of fire deaths are from homes that do not have a smoke alarm present in the home. Finally, where should the smoke detectors be placed in your home? They should be placed on every level of your home, in each sleeping area and in the hallways outside each sleeping area. It is not recommended to have a smoke alarm in your kitchen, but if you decide to hire an

alarm company to install smoke alarms in your home; they can most likely install a heat detector instead of a smoke detector in your home.


City of Jersey Village Budget Process

The process for preparing the budget for next year has begun. Over the next several months, city staff and council members will engage in a series of meetings and work sessions to develop the fiscal year 2016 budget. Formal adoption of the budget for the city is expected to occur at the September city council meeting. The adopted budget lays out the plan for city spending over the period October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016.

The budget not only provides a blueprint for spending, but assigns priorities and goals for staff relating to city programs and services. A significant amount of time is spent considering capital projects and equipment purchases. Additionally, staff provides city council with five-year projections of all major revenue and expenditure categories.

The budget is composed of two parts, the Operating Budget and Capital Improvements. The Operating Budget is comprised mainly of the General Fund. The General Fund is where the city pays for police, fire, and general administrative operations. After the General Fund, the two largest funds in the city are the Utility and Golf Course Funds. The Capital Improvement Budget includes projects related to Sanitary Treatment and Collection Sewer Improvements, Water Production/ Distribution Improvements, Street and Drainage Improvements, and General Community Improvements.

As you can see, municipal budgeting is a complex process that has many moving pieces and parts. We welcome citizen input into the process. All meetings associated with the budget process are public meetings. Notices of budget meetings will be posted to the city's web site. Financial information regarding current or past budgets may also be found at the city's web site within the Finance section.






Scoop the Poop!



Dealing with pet waste is one of those topics that every pet owner must deal with, but no one likes to talk about. The

fact is that the majority of community and neighborhood pet problems result from the inappropriate handling of pet waste. In addition, pet waste is the greatest source of potential health risk for your pet and your family

Your responsibility to clean up after your pet doesn't end when your dog leaves your yard. There are probably fewer things that aggravate neighbors more than a dog that 'goes' in their yard. Pet owners need to clean up after their pet every time they go to the bathroom. Period. No exceptions. Don't make your responsibility somebody else's problem. The person responsible for any dog must remove feces deposited by the dog from any private property other than that of the dog's owner. Remember, removal of animal feces is not just a courtesy, it is an environmental necessity.

Pooper Scooper Law –City of Jersey Village. Section 10-5 summarized (dog and cat poop)

Defecation by dogs or cats.

Sec. 10-5. Animal waste disposal.

(a) It shall be unlawful for the owner or other person having control of any animal to permit the animal to defecate upon the public property of the city or upon the private property of another unless the person immediately removes the feces and properly disposes of it.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to walk a dog on public property or upon the private property of another without carrying at all times a suitable container or other suitable instrument for the removal and disposal of dog feces.
(c) This section shall not apply to a person using a seeing-eye dog.

(Ord. No. 04-21, § 1, 9-20-04)

Pet owners must remove all fecal material deposited by their pets on property they do not own, including neighbors' yards, city parks, school property, public rightsof-way, etc.

A person in control of a dog or cat, when walking outside of their own property with their pet, must have materials to remove feces left by their dog or cat and promptly remove and dispose of them in a sanitary manner.

Violation of this section is punishable upon

conviction by a fine of not less than \$1 or more than \$200. Each violation of this section is a separate offense. \bigstar



Did you know that Fireworks are not permitted within the City Limits of Jersey Village?

The ordinance reads:

The possession, manufacture, storage, sale, handling and use of fireworks are prohibited within the city limits of Jersey Village, Texas. It shall be unlawful and constitute a nuisance for any person to manufacture or sell fireworks within the City of Jersey Village or within the area extending five thousand (5,000) feet outside the city limits and not located within the corporate limits or extraterritorial jurisdiction of another municipality. The city attorney shall take all actions necessary to enforce this ordinance in the area located outside the city limits. Except as herein provided, it shall be unlawful for any person to assemble, possess, store, transport, receive, keep, sell, offer or have in his or her possession with the intent to sell, use, discharge, ignite, detonate, fire or otherwise put in action any fireworks of any description.

Violating this ordinance can result in fines and the confiscation of fireworks. Keep Jersey Village Safe and Silent this 4th of July season. \bigstar

Common Code Violations

The following are a few of the items commonly reported to, or noted by, Code Enforcement:

1. Construction and / or repairs without required permits. Examples; Building, Electrical, Plumbing, Mechanical Permits for Sheds, Fences, Additions, Driveways, Irrigation, Re-roofing and Interior renovations etc.

2. Vehicles, Boats and Utility trailers not properly parked or stored on property and on streets.

3. Trash, grass clippings, and tree limbs etc. being placed for collection at the curb before 5pm on Mondays and Thursdays. 4. Garage sale signs, realtor, and contractor signs placed in the city right of way (between the curb & sidewalk).

5. Lost cat or dog signs being placed on light poles or stop signs.

6. Yard maintenance (high grass).

7. Dogs being allowed to run at large.

If you have any questions regarding code violations, or would like to report a violation, please call 713-466-2129 between the hours of 8 am and 5 pm Monday - Friday. If a code enforcement issue arises after hours, residents should contact the dispatcher on duty at 713-466-5824. If the issue is deemed to be an emergency, dispatch will send a police officer to address the problem. If it is not considered to be an emergency, the Code Enforcement Officer will be notified of the call and will address upon returning to the office.

By following the proper procedure city personnel will be able to address Code Enforcement Violations in a timely manner so that abatement proceedings, if necessary, may begin judiciously. ★

ARTICLE ON THE CALENDAR FOR APPROVING THE CITY OF JERSEY VILLAGE OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGET FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016

The City of Jersey Village fiscal year begins on October 1 and ends on September 30th of the following year. Although the city adopts its budget in the fall, the budget process starts in April with a Staff Budget Retreat. For several evenings in May, City Council and staff conducted a series of meetings, during which goals and objectives for fiscal year 2015-2016 were identified. Summer and early fall represent a busy time for staff, as preparation and adoption of the City Operating and Capital Budgets require significant resources. Below are the remaining key dates in which

City Council and staff will conduct meetings related to next year's budget:

July 20th – July 22nd at 6:00 P.M. Budgets review by City Council and Crime Control Board.

August 17th at 7:00 P.M.

Crime Control Board conducts public hearing on proposed Budget and adopts Budget.

September 21st at 7:00 P.M.

City Council conducts public hearing on proposed City budget and adopts Budget. October 19th at 7:00 P.M. Adoption of Tax Rate, Utility Rates, and other rates.



Burglar Alarm Purchasing Tips

The technology to do this is now available and the City of Jersey Village has partnered with Harris County 911 to allow are citizens to register their cell phones for such alerts when they are sent.

On the main city website, located at www.jerseyvillage.info, the bottom right corner has a button as shown above. Please click on this button and it will take you to an explanation page. Once you agree to the statements on this page it will take you to a registration page. There you can input information and register for this service. Some examples of alerts would be to "shelter in place" because of a hazmat scene or maybe the city is experiencing the potential for "flooding" and you want to know this is about to occur. These are just two examples of what we might send out to all phones in our city. Today, many families do not have a home phone and the only phone they have is a cell phone. Please take advantage of this opportunity and register your cell phones today. ★





Mosquito Control



Summertime in Texas brings swimming, ice cream, and backyard barbecues. Unfortunately it also brings mosquitoes. In addition to itchy bites, mosquitoes can transmit diseases. You can keep mosquito populations under control on your property by following these simple tips:

• Destroy or dispose of tin cans, old tires, buckets, unused plastic swimming pools or other containers that collect and hold water. Do not allow water to accumulate in the saucers of flowerpots, or in pet dishes for more than 2 days.

• Clean debris from rain gutters and remove any standing water under or around structures, or on flat roofs. Check around faucets and air conditioner units and repair leaks or eliminate puddles that remain for several days.

• Change the water in birdbaths and wading pools at least once a week. Commercial products "Mosquito Dunks" and "Mosquito Bits" containing Bti can be purchased at many hardware/ garden stores for homeowner use. Fill or drain puddles, ditches and swampy areas, and either remove, drain or fill tree holes and stumps with mortar.

• Check for trapped water in plastic or canvas tarps used to cover boats, pools, etc. Arrange the tarp to drain the water.

• Check around construction sites or do-it-yourself improvements to ensure that proper backfilling and grading prevent drainage problems.

• Irrigate lawns and gardens carefully to prevent water from standing for several days.

• Adult mosquitoes rest during the day, usually on tall weeds and other vegetation. Mow your lawn regularly, and keep weeds away from your home's foundation. ★



Recycling Tips



The City of Jersey Village Is in your hands!

WCA collects recyclable materials for Jersey Village every Wednesday. Please follow these tips for a successful recycling program:

• Carts should be placed at the curb with the arrows on the lid facing the street. This ensures that the automated truck can easily access and empty the recycling cart.

• Please recycle only the acceptable materials. All recyclable materials may be mixed together inside the cart.

• Protect recyclables from inclement weather by keeping the lid closed.

• Only materials in the cart will be collected. Ensure that you flatten and cut cardboard so that it fits loosely in the cart.

• Items placed outside of your cart will not be collected. Maximize space in your cart by crushing plastic bottles and aluminum cans, and cutting boxes down.

• Ensure that all your cans and bottles are empty before recycling them to avoid contamination of other materials.

• Recycling carts provided by WCA are for recyclables only; not regular trash. Regular trash should be placed at the curb on Tuesdays and Fridays only. Trash put in recycling carts will not be collected.

Remember: Set your recycle cart out by 7 a.m. on Wednesdays but no earlier than 5 p.m. the evening before. Return your cart to your property by the end of the day, after your collection has occurred ★



Help, I've fallen and I can't get up!

What do you do when this happens? The answer is call "**911**". If you need assistance getting up and no one is around to help you get up, call **911**. Even if you have someone there to help you. If they can't get you back into a chair, call **911**.

I received a phone call in the past weeks from a resident who indicated many people in the community are confused as to when they should call "911" for help. When in doubt, call "911".

911 call takers are ready to answer your call and determine your emergency needs. You may not think your situation is an emergency, but when in doubt, call "**911**". I can't emphasize this enough!

911 call takers receive many phone calls. Here is a list of medical call types you might call **911** for.

- Headaches that won't stop
- Nose bleeds that won't stop
- Severe Abdominal Pains

- Excessive Vomiting, Nausea
- Dehydration
- Falls
- Excessive Back Pain
- Lift Assistance
- Breathing problems
- Chest Pains
- Altered Mental Status
- Seizures
- Cardiac Arrest

Please be mindful, that this is not a complete list of reasons to call "911". There are other medical situations that may arise. There are also fire and police related emergencies you should call 911.

The important thing to remember is, you live in a community that has great emergency services (Police, FIRE, EMS) that are ready to respond to whatever your situation might be. When in doubt, call "911"! If you have any questions or concerns about calling 911, give me a call. I'm happy to speak to you about it. My phone number is 713-466-2130 Give me a call. ★

Fire Hydrant Colors Are Changing

As part of our Insurance Service Office (ISO) review, the city learned that our fire hydrants were not painted to meet the National Fire Protection Association Standards (NFPA). ISO requires water departments to follow these NFPA standards when marking fire hydrants. The new color code represents the amount of gallons per minute flowing out of each hydrant. If you have been traveling on Jones Road in the past month, you may have noticed that the hydrants have been repainted. Eventually, all fire hydrants in the city limits will be painted to this standard. All fire hydrants will have a yellow body or barrel color and the caps and bonnet of the hydrant will be painted according the color code as follows:

- Light Blue 1500gpm (gallons per minute) or higher
- Green 1000gpm 1499gpm
- Orange 500gpm 999gpm
- Red 500gpm or less

Staff will continue to repaint all fire hydrants until all of them are updated. \star

City of Jersey Village Budget Update

After several months of preparation, the budget process for the City of Jersey Village is in its final stages. City council will conduct a public hearing and formally adopt next year's budget at its Regular meeting on Monday, September 21, 2015. Prior to adoption, city council will conduct a public hearing to receive citizen comments and preview next year's budget. The budget will be effective for the next fiscal year, which begins October 1, 2015 and ends September 30, 2016.

Property tax rates are projected to remain at \$0.7425 per \$100 of valuation. The current Property Tax Rate has been in effect since 2006. The Jersey Village City Council remains committed to providing the highest level of service to city residents, consistent with available resources. The budget not only funds specific services and programs, but also establishes priorities for the coming year. The Budget is composed of two parts, the Operating Budget and the Capital Improvement Program. The Operating Budget funds the daily operation of the city and is the larger of the two budgets. The Capital Improvement Program Budget incorporates projects that include Sanitary Sewer Treatment and Collection Improvements, one project in the Water Production/Distribution Improvements, and one project in General Community Improvement.

The budget provides for efficient, quality services and ensuring taxpayers receive value for their tax dollars. Notices of the upcoming public hearings will be posted to the city's web site, www.jerseyvillage. info. 

This is a Reminder that Trees Need to be Trimmed!



Sidewalk Obstructions

Pursuant to the City of Jersey Village, Texas, Code of Ordinances: SEC.14-310 (6) Landowner responsibilities. The landowner shall be responsible for:

(e) The owner of a tree overhanging a street or right-of-way within the city shall prune the branches so that the branches will not severely obstruct the light from any street lamp or obstruct the view of any street intersection and so that there shall be a clear space of 13 feet above street surface of [or] eight feet above the sidewalk surface. The owner shall be responsible for removing all dead, diseased, or dangerous trees, or broken or decayed limbs, including tree stumps, which constitute a menace to the safety of the public. Tree pruning shall be done in accordance with accepted arboricultural standards. ★





Change your clock, Change your battery!



Guess what time it is? That's right, time to change your battery in your smoke detector. Every year almost 3000 people lose their lives to fire. Properly installed and maintained smoke alarms in the home are considered one of the best and least expensive means of providing an early warning of a potentially deadly fire. Smoke alarms save lives, prevent injury and reduce damage from fire. It is the early warning system that will get your attention. Did you know that when you sleep the one true sense that works is your hearing? Many people do not realize this.

There is a saying that most people are familiar with, "Change your clock, Change your battery." November 1 is daylight savings time and time to change your clocks. At 2:00am move your clocks back one hour. It is also time to change your batteries in your smoke detectors. We won't ask you to do this at 2:00am, but sometime during that day it's out with the old and in with the new battery for your smoke detector. Take a permanent marker and write the word "used" on the old batteries. These batteries can now be utilized for your children's games.

Once the new battery is in don't forget every month to push the button on the smoke detector and check to make sure it is working. \bigstar

Finding Lost Pets

Here are steps you can take to make it easier to find your pets if they are ever lost. ALWAYS KEEP IDENTIFICATION ON YOUR PET and check tags often making sure they are legible. MICROCHIP YOUR PET! Talk to your veterinarian. SPAY/ NEUTER YOUR PET! REPAIR LOOSE BOARDS AND HOLES IN FENCING!

IF YOU PET IS LOST IMMEDIATELY TAKE THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS!.

Post signs at grocery stores, pet stores, veterinary clinics, and churches.

Bicycle Safety

Bicycling is a very popular recreational sport especially in the neighborhoods of Jersey Village. Not only is it a great way to get some exercise but also a way to get out and spend time with family, friends and meet your neighbors. But your trip could end in tragedy if you don't ride safely. Just like driving a vehicle on the road, cyclists must observe what's around them at all times and make sure that they are following State Law especially when it comes to stopping at Stop Signs.

The following are some safety tips and a few laws that would pertain to people riding their bikes along the streets in Jersey Village or anywhere in the state.

Safety starts before you even mount your bike. Before you ride:

• Check to make sure that all parts are secured and in working order each time you ride.

• Examine your wheels to check the tire pressure and inflate to recommended maximum pressure—look for damage and tread wear.

• Ask neighbors and the postman if they have seen your pet. Print and hand out flyers with your pet's photo and your phone numbers.



Notify the police if you believe that your pet may have been stolen. • If lost near a busy highway or road, contact the Texas Department of Transportation.

When you find your pet! Make certain to inform all the places you contacted and remove all flyers.

Lost Cat Tip: The majority of "lost" cats remain in the general area from which they disappeared.

Lost Dog Tip: A "lost" dog will likely travel into the oncoming wind. Make this your first direction of search.

Bicycles are considered vehicles according to Texas Traffic Law. Therefore, when riding on a city street you must follow the "Rules of the Road" as you would in a car. Here are a few other laws; • You must stop at Stop Signs and Red Lights

• When riding at night, you are required to have a white light on the front of the bike and a red reflector or light on the back

• You have to ride near the curb and ride in the same direction as traffic

• You may ride two abreast as long as you are not impeding traffic



City of Jersey Village Tax Rate Adoption

After a series of public budget meetings, the Jersey Village City Council adopted the budget for fiscal year 2015-2016. A public hearing was held on September 21st to present the proposed budget and receive citizen input prior to formal adoption that evening. The budget will be effective for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2015 and lasting through September 30, 2016.

Commensurate with budget adoption is the adoption of the city tax rate. On October 19th, City Council approved a property tax rate of \$0.7425 per \$100 of valuation. The property taxes generated by this rate provide a majority of revenue for the city's General Fund. Property taxes also fund the city's Debt Service Fund. In all matters, the city must follow the State of Texas guidelines for proposing and adopting a tax rate. According to State guidelines, if the tax rate proposed exceeds the effective tax rate (a calculated rate that would provide the taxing unit with about the same amount of revenue it received in the year before), or rollback rate (calculated maximum rate allowed by law without voter approval), whichever is lower, the city is obligated to conduct additional public hearings.

In the case of the City of Jersey Village, the effective tax rate of \$0.633365 is lower than the proposed tax rate of \$0.7425. Accordingly, the city conducted two public hearings prior to adopting this year's tax rate. These hearings took place on Monday October 5th, 2015 and Monday October 12th.

New programs and expenditures for Fiscal year 2015-2016 (also known as supplementals) that will be funded this year include:

- ADA Path Entries to Clark Henry Park \$30,000
- Training for Volunteer Firefighters \$7,000
- Traffic Calming Study Phase 2
- \$39,165
- Pool Deck Repairs
- \$6,500
- City Hall repair from water damage \$25,000
- Shade Cover & Play Piece for Kiddie Pool \$10,000
- Paint Striping Machine (Streets) \$15,000

The Finance Department will be happy to assist any residents with questions relating to the city budget or tax rate. Copies of

• Paint, if stored correctly (upside down with a tight seal around the lid), can last years.


How Can You Help?

The Jersey Village Citizens' Fire Academy is open to anyone over the age of 18. This program is designed to give the citizens of Jersey Village an opportunity to learn about their emergency services provider and gain valuable safety and health education. Participants will be put through training similar to that of a beginning firefighter, as well as skills needed for CERT (Community Emergency Response Team). There will be no cost for this course and all materials necessary will be provided to the student.

Teaching Youth Cyberethics

At the Jersey Village Police Department we make it a priority to keep all children safe. From toddlers to teens, our kids should be able to grow up in a health environment free from predators. One of those environments that is especially prevalent in our society is the internet. Just as protecting youth from dangers on the Internet is important, so is protecting the Internet from young people who might abuse it. As parents, caregivers, teachers, and adults, you work to teach youth Internet safety by telling them to keep their personal information safe and avoid predators, but it's just as important to teach youth cyberethics.

Teaching teens about the ethical treatment of others on the web and of websites and intellectual property (such as music, videos, and written materials) in cyberspace can help prevent cybercrime. While youth who commit cybercrimes may realize that their actions are wrong, they may not know that their Internet behaviors are illegal. Cybercrime is categorized in the following three ways:

• The computer as a target (using a computer to attack other computers)

• The computer as a weapon (using a computer to commit a crime)

• The computer as an accessory (using a computer to store illegal files or information) These categories include crimes such as launching viruses, storing illegal files (such as child pornography), committing fraud, infringing copyrights, and pirating software, among others.

Many youth commit cybercrime by

• Downloading and sharing copyrighted video and music files

 Harassing others via chat bots (computer programs designed to imitate human conversation)

• Hacking into school computer networks to deface websites, enter sites that the school forbids, or change grades

The best way to prevent youth from committing cybercrimes is to educate them about ethical and legal rules of the Internet, and the emotional and financial costs of cybercrimes to victims. Moreover, cybercrimes carry real consequences. Teach youth that their actions in cyberspace are not anonymous, and that real people are affected by their crimes. 

Driving

Shopping

• Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.

• Dress casually and comfortably.

• Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.

• Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.

• Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.

• Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.

• Keep cash in your front pocket.

• Notify the credit card issuer immediately

if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused. • Keep a record of all of your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.

• Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas, transportation terminals, bus stops, on buses and other rapid transit.

• Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.

• Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.

At Home

• Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes.

• When leaving home for an extended time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house and pick up your newspapers and mail.

• Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.

• Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors.

(6) Perform other duties that may be specifically assigned to it by the city council that may have a bearing on the preparation or accomplishment of the comprehensive plan.

(7) Serve on the Capital Improvements Advisory Committee.

The City Council invites interested Jersey Village citizens who wish to serve on the Planning and Zoning Commission to complete an application. The Council will review applications received at its December Council meeting, and appoint applicants in compliance with the terms of the Charter. Interested citizens are encouraged to complete an application and submit it to the City Secretary as soon as possible.
